Chris Thompson presented the District's summary of the 2019 Family Survey, that was presented to the Teaching and Learning Board Committee on January 6, after analysis by three different stakeholder groups; Family Technology Advisory, Administrators, Teacher Advisory.

Several next step recommendations are already underway with specific timelines and deliverables. The Advisory Group members asked several clarifying questions and appreciated the scope of the response and the relatively short timeline for action.



One question was asked about how to find the District's Digital Citizenship Curriculum. The link was shared with families at the beginning of the year and can be found here. This curriculum will be reviewed by the Teaching and Learning Committee in March/April.

An update on the progress made towards the identified next steps will be presented at our next meeting on Wednesday, March 4th.

6:45pm - 7:30pm - Internet Filter Criteria

The second half of the advisory group meeting was designed to build participants' knowledge of internet filters so that advisory group members could help prioritize internet filter features as we consider a possible replacement for Securly.

Dan Scott presented an informative and entertaining overview of internet filtering and specifically, how filtering works in Elmbrook. The slides used for this presentation are attached.

Dan also presented a list of possible internet filtering features that were collected from several of the leading education internet filtering products. Members were asked to identify their top 2 features. Administrators, teachers, and technical staff members will also complete this exercise and the collective input will help guide the evaluation of filtering products.

Next steps for the filtering selection process include:

- February 7 Collect feature priorities from administrators, teachers, technical staff
- February 14 Secure Filter Evaluation Team Membership
- March 3 Release RFP for Internet Filter
- April 3 Product Demonstrations to Filter Evaluation Team
- April 10 Conduct Reference Checks on Preferred Product
- April 30 Install Product in a Test Environment to Evaluate Features/Functionality
- May 15 Finalize Contract with Company
- By July 1 Deploy Internet Filter

Internet Filter Features by Stakeholder Group

Possible Parent Features (exist in one or more filtering products today)

- Reporting portal Transparent access for parents to check student use during the school day and at home.
 - Check online activity 6 (6 = votes from Advisory Group Members)
 - o Real time reporting 0
 - Email notifications 0



- Control access during non-school hours Parents would have the ability to block websites, categories or even turn off the internet.
 - Customize rules 1
 - Pause internet access 1
- Identify at-risk behaviors Monitoring of at-risk behaviors including bullying, self-harm and violence. Parents have the ability to opt-in to alerts.
 - o Opt-in alerting 0
 - Alerting parents of risky online behaviors 5
 - o Bullying/self-harm/violence 2
- Protects personal devices Extend filtering and reporting to family owned devices 0
